The dinner was my wife's idea. She said it would give me an opportunity to meet Mackenzie, hear her story, and ask her any questions that would help me come to a decision. If we were going to do this, we needed to be on the same page.

How he'd told her he'd never been married before, never had kids. How, when she'd unexpectedly got pregnant and told him that there was no way she'd be able to carry the baby to term, that she and her ex-husband had tried for years but her body couldn't support a viable pregnancy, he'd been so sweet and supportive. How he'd said he would marry her. How once the baby looked like it would make it, he'd turned into someone she no longer knew, a vicious, controlling abuser who constantly demeaned her and was now demanding an abortion.

How she'd found out he had a wife and two kids in Connecticut, his job here in Colorado allowing him to ferry surreptitiously between two lives.
